RULES OF PROCEDURE

According to RSA 40, the town Moderator determines the procedures to be used in Town Meetings. The Moderator determines the rules without regard to parliamentary or other procedural rules. The voters can overturn the Moderator's rules at any time, however. A motion to overturn the Moderator's rules, or establish new rules, will always take precedence to other business which is already "on the floor".

So that you will know the ground rules by which we are maintaining order, these procedural rules are announced to you ahead of time.

- The Moderator will read each article in its entirety before that article is considered.
- There can be no discussion until there has been a motion under the article. (usually the first motion is to approve the article as it appears on the warrant)
- All motions must be seconded by a different individual.
- Discussion will only take place after a motion has been moved and seconded.
- All discussion must take place only when called upon by the Moderator. You must have permission from the Moderator before you can speak.
- When the Moderator recognizes you, standup, speak out loudly and announce your name before proceeding with your comments.
- If you want to change a portion of a motion, you can do so by making an amendment. We will consider only one move to amend at any given time. When discussion regarding an amendment comes to a conclusion, the amendment will be voted upon. If the amendment passes we will then continue considering the original motion as it has now been amended. If the amendment fails, we will return to considering the motion in its form prior to the motion to amend.
- A secret written ballot will be used on any article when requested by any 5 voters in writing (RSA 40:4-a).
- A vote will be re-tabulated by secret written ballot when requested in writing or orally by only 7 voters (RSA 40:40b). This action must be requested before we have already moved onto the next item of business.

One final word of advice from your Moderator: If you want to get action from the Town Meeting, you have to make a motion. It's okay to get up and ask a question or make a comment (as long as it's relevant to what's on the table), but if you want the Town Meeting to discuss and vote on your idea, you have to get it on the table with a motion. Let's work together to have a successful and efficient meeting.

TOWN OF FREEDOM

ELECTION OF OFFICERS: TUESDAY, MARCH 14, 2017

AND

TOWN MEETING: SATURDAY, MARCH 18, 2017

This year the election of town and school officers was held on Tuesday and Town Meeting was held on Saturday.

Please note that balloting took place as scheduled and posted and by statute during the 'storm of the century' nor'easter that occurred this date, causing many towns to delay and re-schedule amidst storm closures and conflicting advice provided by various state agencies. Based on advice received the NH Secretary of State and the Attorney General's Office, many towns, including Freedom, kept to the posted schedule.

166 ballots cast for this election, with 1153 voters on the checklist at the beginning of the day, one new voter registering during the day, totaling 1154 at day's end, for a 13% +/- voter turn-out; (b) the election results are included herein and (c) a write-in candidate must have received a minimum of five (5) votes to be included or have been declared the winner with less than five (5) votes:

TOWN WARRANT 2017 – MINUTES [ABRIDGED]

The Moderator, Don Johnson, opened Town Meeting on Saturday, March 18, 2017, at 1:00 p.m.

Mr. Johnson reviewed the Rules of Procedure and directed the meeting to Page 5 in this year's Town Report and how to use "Point of Order".

Mr. Johnson introduced himself, then the election officials seated on the stage: Libby, Priebe, Town Clerk, John Ratigan, Town Counsel, Les Babb, Neal Boyle and Ernest Day, Jr., Selectmen. He then introduced election workers Beth Earle, Chuck Brooks and Jean Magnussen, Deputy Town Clerk, then the Supervisors of the Checklist: Daniel (Bud) Brooks, Pat McCoy and Carol Stansell - who were located at the back of the room, checking people in as they entered the meeting room, using the voter checklist, and providing the voting cards.

Mr. Johnson noted that the Town Report this year had been dedicated to three people celebrating varying milestones as members of the Freedom Volunteer Fire Department. He introduced them to the meeting by having them stand, thanking them for their service:

Fire/Rescue: Cubby (Justin) Brooks - 30
years

Firefighter: Dusty (George) Boewe - 38
years

Firefighter: Scott Brooks, Sr. - 40 years

Mr. Johnson also called to the meeting's attention to the dedication in the town report to Elizabeth ("Betty") Godfrey, a long time Freedom resident who had served in many capacities within the town and was always a participant in town meetings.

Mr. Johnson then asked for a moment of silence in recognition of those we have lost, including Frank Meserve, Jr., Wendell Brooks, and Howard Bouve - all Freedom residents who had served the town in many capacities over the years, representing a significant loss to the Town.

After the moment of silence, Mr. Johnson led the meeting in the Pledge of Allegiance to the flag.

Mr. Johnson then turned the meeting over to Selectman Les Babb - who thanked the townspeople for his re-election and explained how hard the selectmen work to keep the tax rate as low as possible. Mr. Babb also told that over his fifteen years in office, the Board of Selectmen had been able to build a fund balance to reduce the amounts to be borrowed, also having established twice a year billing for the payment of real estate taxes, which stopped the need to borrow money to pay bills. The Selectmen face the challenge of trying to keep the tax rate low but meet budget demands. The municipal tax rate is the only portion the town has total control over - this year \$4.35. They also have to deal with the County, School and Education tax rates. He also noted that the Board of Selectmen have replaced items as needed, rather than replacing them on a given schedule, using as an example the 1963 York rake that still works fine and is still being used.

Mr. Johnson proceeded with the reading of the Warrant:

To the inhabitants of the Town of Freedom, in the County of Carroll, in the State of New Hampshire, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in Freedom, on Tuesday, the 14th day of March, 2017 at 9:00 o'clock in the forenoon to act upon Articles 1 through 3, which shall be voting by official ballot for the election of Town officers and zoning amendments. The polls shall be open from 9:00 a.m. and shall close at 7 p.m., unless there is a vote to keep the polls open to a later hour. The ballots will be counted after the polls close at 7 p.m. [Note: due to the storm - the ballots were counted the next night.]

The business meeting to present, discuss, and act upon Articles 4 through 23 will commence at 1:00 p.m. on Saturday, March 18th, 2017 at the Freedom Town Hall.

Mr. Johnson advised the meeting that the Freedom School District had raised and appropriated the total sum of \$4,218,760.00 at their Annual Meeting held at the Freedom Elementary School on Monday, March 13, 2017 at 7:00 p.m.

Article 1: (To vote by Official Ballot):
To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.

Article 2: (To vote by Official Ballot):

Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 1 as proposed by the planning board for the town zoning ordinance as follows: amend Article 904 to remove sections 904.3.3 and 904.4.2, which restrict accessory dwelling units to one bedroom. Add a new section 904.3.3 to require a door (which is not required to be unlocked) between accessory dwelling units that are attached to the primary dwelling. Freedom's zoning ordinance already has provisions for accessory dwelling units (ADUs), but the current ordinance does not comply with all requirements of a new state law, SB 146. This ballot question asks voters to approve two changes required by the law to bring Freedom's regulations into compliance with the new state rules. (Recommended by the Planning Board)

VOTE: YES 125 NO 30

ARTICLE 2 PASSES.

Article 3: (To vote by Official Ballot):

Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 2 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town zoning ordinance as follows: Add sections 304.6.6.3 to the zoning ordinance to specify how trees can be removed in the shorefront to control storm water run-

off to better protect water quality? The planning board is proposing this to protect the water quality of Freedom’s lakes and rivers. While there are state regulations regarding the removal of trees along the water, this amendment will allow the town to enforce these rules (rather than rely on the state to do it).

(Recommended by the Planning Board)

VOTE: YES 115 NO 40

ARTICLE 3 PASSES.

Article 4:

Shall the Town of Freedom vote to adopt the provisions of RSA 72:28-b, All Veterans’ Tax Credit? If adopted, the credit will be available to any resident, or the spouse or surviving spouse of any resident, who (1) served not less than 90 days on active service in the armed forces of the United States and was honorably discharged or an officer honorably separated from services and is not eligible for or receiving a credit under RSA 72:28 or RSA 72:35. If adopted, the credit granted will be \$250.00 the same amount as the standard or optional veterans’ tax credit voted by the Town of Freedom under RSA 72:28.

MOTION: Les Babb

SECONDED: Marty Perreault

Mr. Babb spoke to the Article, noting legislation had been passed on August 8, 2016, allowing this change and it is good to recognize the veterans.

No discussion.

VOTE ON ARTICLE 4: YES, ARTICLE 4 CARRIES.

Moderator Johnson read Article 5 in its entirety by section total in order to obtain a motion and second to get it to the floor for discussion.

MOTION: Les Babb
SECONDED: Cubby Brooks

Mr. Johnson explained that the meeting would proceed to discuss this article section by section, starting first with General Government - \$465,924.

Selectman Babb explained that the negotiations with the health insurance company to be self-insured, discussed at last year's town meeting, did not work out, noting that changes had been made to the current insurance provided by increasing the deductible and the co-pay, amounting to \$43,000 in savings.

No further discussion on General Government.

Public Safety - \$581,331.

Mr. Babb noted that the Fire Department budget was up \$23,000, \$20,000 had been raised and appropriated in the past to have a cistern on Kidder Drive. The town has been unable to find a good contract for the construction of that cistern, so the plan now is to put in a dry hydrant somewhere near Round Pond or Loon Lake.

Discussion.

Matt Tyler made a **MOTION TO AMEND** the budget by adding \$1,100.00 to the police department budget line item.

SECONDED by Joyce Watson.

Officer Tyler said the \$1100.00 increase would be for general maintenance of their computer system and will allow them to connect with the Sheriff's Office and eventually they will be

totally mobile, enabling them to have all the information that dispatch has.

No further discussion.

VOTE ON MOTION TO AMEND ARTICLE 5 by adding \$1,100.00 to the police department's budget: YES, Amendment passes, making the new bottom line total for Article 5 \$2,540,991.00.

Highways and Streets - \$824,083.00

No discussion.

Sanitation - \$211,567.00.

Selectman Babb complimented Cubby on doing a good job at the transfer station, also noting the hours will be extended.

No further discussion.

Health - \$15,893.

Ann Pierce asked why the amount for Starting Point was a third less than previously requested.

Mr. Babb explained that the Selectmen only put in the amounts requested by the agencies.

No further discussion.

Welfare - \$ 11,000

Culture and Recreation - \$ 96,212

Conservation - \$ 21,330.

No discussion.

Debt Service - \$312,551.

Paul Olzerowicz thanked the Selectmen for the opening summary which answered many questions. He said he would like to encourage the Selectmen to continue to study and plan as to when to put the money aside and to continue projections and planning accordingly. He said he supports the article.

No further discussion.

VOTE ON ARTICLE 5 AS AMENDED to a new bottom line of \$2,540,991: YES, ARTICLE 5 AS AMENDED CARRIES.

Article 6:

To see if the Town will vote to repurpose One Hundred Nine Thousand Seven Hundred Thirty Eight Dollars (\$109,738) in unexpended bond proceeds from the One Million Four Hundred Fifty-Nine Thousand Fifteen Dollars (\$1,459,015) in bonds authorized by a vote of the Town meeting on March 12, 2016 and issued on July 14, 2016 to finance roadway and drainage improvements to Ossipee Lake and Bennett Road; and to use such unexpended funds currently in fund balance, to finance the replacement of an existing corrugated metal culvert with a precast concrete box culvert at the intersection of Moulton and Youngs Hill Roads. (2/3rds vote required)

MOTION: Les Babb

SECONDED: Scott Brooks, Sr.

Selectman Babb explained that this Bond had been for repairs to the Ossipee Lake Road and Bennett Road and when not all the money was withdrawn, a check was sent to the Town for the unused amount. This amount would go in to the general fund if not re-purposed. The Selectmen want to repurpose the \$109,738 for the culvert.

Discussion.

**VOTE ON ARTICLE 6: YES - ARTICLE 6
CARRIES.** [Hand count not initially taken at this point.]

For the purposes of these Minutes and clarity, the following is inserted in Warrant order but not time order:

During discussion on Article 9, the Town Attorney, John Ratigan, spoke to the Moderator, Donald Johnson, and explained that for Article 6, he was quite sure an actual hand count needed to be taken and the results included in the minutes to satisfy the 2/3 majority requirement.

Moderator Johnson asked for a Motion to re-visit Article 6 and obtain a hand-count:

SECONDED by Paul Olzerowicz

**VOTE: 104 VOTES in favor of Article 6; No votes
against.**

**Article 6 confirmed to have carried and to have met the
2/3 vote required.**

[Note: hand count total initially announced at 105 in favor. Supervisor of the Checklist Carol Stansell made a Point of Order to the Moderator - stating that only 104 had been signed in to the hall and entitled to vote. Hand count number revised to 104, after it was noted that one person had walked from one side of the hall to the other during the counting and had been counted twice in error.]

We have audited the financial statements of the governmental activities, each major fund, and the aggregate remaining fund information of the Town of Freedom, New Hampshire for the year ended December 31, 2016. Professional standards require that we provide you with information about our responsibilities under generally accepted auditing standards, as well as certain information related to the planned scope and timing of our audit. We have communicated such information in our letter to you dated January 26, 2017. Professional standards also require that we communicate to you the following information related to our audit.

Significant Audit Findings

Qualitative Aspects of Accounting Practices

Management is responsible for the selection and use of appropriate accounting policies. The significant accounting policies used by the Town of Freedom, New Hampshire are described in Note I to the financial statements. No new accounting policies were adopted and the application of existing policies was not changed during the year ended December 31, 2016. We noted no transactions entered into by the Town of Freedom, New Hampshire during the year for which there is a lack of authoritative guidance or consensus. All significant transactions have been recognized in the financial statements in the proper period.

Accounting estimates are an integral part of the financial statements prepared by management and are based on management's knowledge and experience about past and current events and assumptions about future events. Certain accounting estimates are particularly sensitive because of their significance to the financial statements and because of the possibility that future events affecting them may differ significantly from those expected.

The most sensitive estimates affecting the financial statements of the Governmental Activities were:

Management's estimates of the useful lives of depreciable capital assets are based on historical utilization of assets. We evaluated the key factors and assumptions used to develop the useful lives of depreciable capital assets in determining that it is reasonable in relation to the financial statements taken as a whole.

Significant estimates also include actuarial assumptions used in determining pension costs which are based on plan audited financial statements. We evaluated the assumptions used in the plan audited financial statements to determine that they are reasonable in relation to the financial statements as a whole.

The financial statement disclosures are neutral, consistent, and clear.

Difficulties Encountered in Performing the Audit

We encountered no significant difficulties in dealing with management in performing and completing our audit.

Corrected and Uncorrected Misstatements

Professional standards require us to accumulate all known and likely misstatements identified during the audit, other than those that are clearly trivial, and communicate them to the appropriate level of management. The attached schedules summarize uncorrected misstatements of the financial statements Management has determined that their effects are immaterial, both individually and in the aggregate, to the financial statements. Please see the attached schedule of material misstatements detected as a result of audit procedures and corrected by management.

Disagreements with Management

For purposes of this letter, a disagreement with management is a financial accounting, reporting, or auditing matter, whether or not resolved to our satisfaction, that could be significant to the financial statements or the auditor's report. We are pleased to report that no

such disagreements arose during the course of our audit.

Management Representations

We have requested certain representations from management that are included in the management representation letter dated October 12, 2017.

Management Consultations with Other Independent Accountants

In some cases, management may decide to consult with other accountants about auditing and accounting matters, similar to obtaining a "second opinion" on certain situations. If a consultation involves application of an accounting principle to the Town of Freedom, New Hampshire's financial statements or a determination of the type of auditor's opinion that may be expressed on those statements, our professional standards require the consulting accountant to check with us to determine that the consultant has all the relevant facts. To our knowledge, there were no such consultations with other accountants.

Other Audit Findings or Issues

We generally discuss a variety of matters, including the application of accounting principles and auditing standards, with management each year prior to retention as the Town of Freedom, New Hampshire's auditors. However, these discussions occurred in the normal course of our professional relationship and our responses were not a condition to our retention.

Other Matters

We applied certain limited procedures to the management's discussion and analysis, budgetary comparison analysis, schedule of changes in the Town's proportionate share of the net pension liability, schedule of Town contributions, and the notes to required supplementary information, which are required supplementary information (RSI) that supplements the basic financial statements. Our procedures consisted of inquiries of management regarding the methods of preparing the information and comparing the information for consistency with management's responses to our inquiries, the basic financial statements, and other knowledge we obtained during our audit of the basic financial statements. We did not audit the RSI and do not express an opinion or provide any

assurance on the RSI.

We were engaged to report on the combining nonmajor fund financial statements, which accompany the financial statements but are not RSI. With respect to this supplementary information, we made certain inquiries of management and evaluated the form, content, and methods of preparing the information to determine that the information complies with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America, the method of preparing it has not changed from the prior period, and the information is appropriate and complete in relation to our audit of the financial statements. We compared and reconciled the supplementary information to the underlying accounting records used to prepare the financial statements or to the financial statements themselves.

Restriction on Use

This information is intended solely for the use of the Board of Selectmen and management of the Town of Freedom, New Hampshire and is not intended to be, and should not be, used by anyone other than these specified parties.

Freedom Public Library 2017 Annual Report

The library has had another busy and successful year. There are approximately 450 members who borrowed materials in 2017 and we welcomed 126 new members. There were 13,000 visits to the library, virtually identical to 2016. Circulation increased in nearly every area.

The library continues to offer a variety of programs for children, teens and adults. The monthly afterschool program and Pizza & Movie nights during the school year are extremely well attended as are weekly Preschool Storytimes. All the grades from Freedom Elementary make regular visits to the library and every student has a library card. A group of people come to play Mah Jongg twice a week. The library's long-running book club has a devoted following. The 11th annual Winter Film Series – six films followed by a soup supper – continues to be a big hit. The Friends of the Library offered several excellent programs including ones on gardening, the music of WWI, and tiny houses plus a visit from storyteller and humorist Rebecca Rule.

There were 203 people who actively took part in the library's Summer Reading Program for kids, teens and adults, an increase in all age groups over 2016 including an astounding 33% increase among adult participation. Summer programs kept children of all ages engaged.

New in 2017

- We now have a Library Assistant, Amanda Feuerborn, who runs the library when Chris and Elizabeth are away.
- The library's vestibule was completely renovated with donations in memory of Elisabeth Towle.
- The main bathroom was updated using donations given in memory of Bill Fritz.
- Students, teachers and parents can now return library materials in the new book drop located in the school lobby, paid for by the Friends of the Library.
- A popular new graphic novels section was added in the children's room.

- We now have a telescope to loan, thanks to a donation by the Astronomical Society of NH.
- The website www.freedompubliclibrary.org was revamped.
- The library launched an early literacy program, 1000 Books Before Kindergarten, which encourages parents to read to their young children.
- Game Night for Adults was a big hit and will become a monthly event in 2018.
- We now have an ongoing Dungeons & Dragons group for teens.
- The library used funds from the Freedom Public Library Expendable Trust Fund to have significant tree work completed and for the installation of a mini split system to provide air conditioning in the library's lower level.

One of the most wonderful things about the Freedom Public Library is how rich it is in volunteer and community support. We have a large number of dedicated volunteers who help during all of the library's open hours and put in countless hours on special projects and programs. The support of these volunteers and the extra funds and programming provided by the Friends of the Library help make the library a vibrant and valuable community resource. If you are not already a member, we hope you will come get a library card, and if you are looking for a way to give back to the community, consider becoming a Library or Friends of the Library volunteer!

Planning Board Submission to the Freedom Town Report

Under New Hampshire state law, the planning board acts on applications for site plan reviews, subdivisions, mergers of lots, and boundary line adjustments. We had three types of applications in 2017.

The board approved three site plan reviews for camps—Camp Huckins, Camp Cody, and Camp Robin Hood. We see two or three camps every year as they continue to improve and expand facilities for their campers. The board approved a four-lot major subdivision in December in the general residential district. We acted on one merger of lots.

The other statutory requirement of planning board to New Hampshire is to work on a master plan. The board is now updating the 2006 plan, using the community survey completed in 2015, to guide its efforts. The vision statement and demographics, housing, land-use, natural resources, and historical resources chapters are complete. The facilities and transportation chapters are underway. The Board of Selectmen have appointed an Advisory Committee on Aging to study ways to help seniors stay in Freedom. If you would like to be involved in the development of the master plan, please contact Janice at the town office (539-6323) and she will pass your name on to the board.

The planning board is proposing two changes to the zoning ordinance, which will be voted on the ballot on March 13, 2018.

1. Impervious Surfaces on Shorefront Lots

This proposal adds language to section 304.6. Shorefront District – Other Requirements regarding impervious surfaces in the shorefront. The intent of adopting this language is to add existing state regulations on impervious surfaces to the Freedom zoning ordinance. The language specifies the actions to manage stormwater a home owner must take depending on the percent of impervious surfaces covering the lots.

Proposed Ballot Language: Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 2 as proposed by the planning board for the town zoning ordinance as follows: add section 304.6.7 Impervious Surfaces on Shorefront Lots to article 304? This addition will mirror the state's requirements under RSA 483-B:9 V.(g) regarding the percent of impervious surfaces and stormwater management plan requirements (as published in the 2017-2018 edition of NH Planning and Land Use Regulation). Property owners must already comply with these regulations. This will allow the town of Freedom to protect water resources locally.

The full text of the section 304.6 is on file at the Town Clerk's office and is available for public inspection during the Clerk's normal business hours.

2. Small Wind Energy Systems:

Adopting this language will mirror state requirements while allowing the town to oversee wind energy installations in the town.

Ballot Question: Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 3 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town zoning ordinance as follows: Add Article 17: Small Wind Energy Systems Ordinance that accommodates small wind energy systems in appropriate locations? Adopting this language will mirror state requirements while allowing the town to oversee wind energy installations in the town.

ZONING BOARD OF ADJUSTMENT REPORT

The Zoning Board of Adjustment reviewed 33 applications in 2017; 22 of those were requests for dimensional variances (requests to build new structures or additions which are located at least in part in the side, front, or rear setbacks). Nine of the requests for dimensional variances were granted, nine were withdrawn, one was denied, and three were continued to 2018. The Board also heard one application for an appeal from administrative decision. The Board also;

- Granted a special exception to allow Femino Family Investment Trust to cut trees and install erosion control in the Shore Front District.
- Granted a special exception to allow Mr. Apanel a home occupation.
- Granted a special exception to allow Ms. Monaco to cut trees the Shore Front District.
- Granted a special exception approving Mr. & Ms. Barbone erosion control plan in the Shore Front District.
- Granted a special exception to allow Mr. & Ms. Panagiotakos to cut trees and install erosion control in the Shore Front District.

Special exceptions are uses that must meet criteria outlined in the zoning code. Two applications were withdrawn from the board and one was continued to 2018.

Freedom Conservation Commission Annual Report 2017

Freedom is a unique community with an abundance of natural resources. It is a priority among residents that these resources are maintained and preserved as the town grows and change occurs.

The Westward Shores litigation continued into 2017. Despite the time and effort of many, especially Paul Elie and Anne Cunningham, the project was approved in May and construction resumed soon after. Hopefully this matter will help raise awareness and concerns for projects this large in the future. Chapter 3 of the Master Plan, Natural Resources, has been updated. This document is an all inclusive study of Freedom's land, soils, waterways, aquifer, conservation lands, wildlife, open space and more.

In September there was a joint meeting with the Selectmen, the FCC and the FAC. Also present were representatives from NH Dept of Natural Resources, NH Fish and Game and Town Forester Barry Keith. Topics regarding the Town Forest discussed included an updated Stewardship Plan, timber harvesting and trapping.

Later in the year, the board heard a presentation from Forrest Bell, in conjunction with Green Mountain CC, on Water Shed Management. His plan covers the conditions of our lakes and ponds, future build out, monitoring and course of action going forward. The board will be discussing this matter further.

Goals for 2018 include the study of the Water Shed Management Plan, looking into Conservation Land Acquisitions, Large Scale Water Extraction laws, training for board members and all other matters that may arise.

I would like to thank the members of the Freedom Conservation Commission Paul Elie (Past Chair), Alice Custard, Cheryl Harris, Sarah Tabor, Sue Hoople (alternate), and our newest members JP McVitty and Frank Lalumiere (alternate) for their time and effort this year. I would also like to thank Rob Hatch for his work with the FAC and the FCC over the years. Finally, thank you to Dianne, Janice, Stacy and Karen for helping to keep the facts straight.

FOREST ADVISORY COMMITTEE

Once again our town forest has received high marks from the State Department of Cultural and Natural Resources, the agency that oversees the easement which guides the management of our forest. For this many thanks are owed to all of those who have given of their time to serve as volunteers, board members and elected officials. Many thanks as well to our town office staff and our town forester for their efforts, expertise and tutelage.

Maintaining our forest requires effective partnerships and respect for the variety of permitted uses. I would like to draw attention to the efforts of the Scrub Oaks Scramblers snowmobile club. Those of us not active in motor sports also benefit from the trail work and winter parking availability provided by SOS. The club has the organization, equipment and volunteers, without which winter access would be much more limited. As a town forest neighbor, I know that there are many times in the winter when the forest is quiet for those who prefer it that way. If you enjoy winter access consider supporting the club's efforts.

The 2016 FAC annual report identified the importance of maintaining our twelve wildlife openings: "As logging proceeds decrease in the foreseeable future, alternative funding needs to be explored if these critical forest habitats are to be sustained." Our committee will rekindle efforts to seek sponsorship for wildlife areas. Recognition of benefactors would be made in our annual report. Signage at our three kiosks would indicate the person or group who sponsors each Wildlife Area over a given time. Anyone interested in supporting this effort please contact the FAC.

As spring approaches we encourage forest users to be mindful to not engage in any activity that ruts up the trail during mud season. We also thank all those who leave the parking areas clean and inviting.

FREEDOM AQUATIC INVASIVE SPECIES COMMITTEE (FAISC)

New Hampshire attracts visitors from many areas – both domestic and international – and our lakes and streams are a key attraction. Invasive species are becoming a significant challenge throughout the country and we have not escaped this serious threat to our environment and our economy. Here on the Ossipee Lake system, we are currently focused on variable milfoil – an aquatic invasive plant that is remarkably adaptable. Left unchecked this non-native species will spread dramatically as it has no native competition. Complete eradication is all but impossible so our work deals with minimizing current infestations through active management and employing preventative measures to reduce the risk of new infestations.

Unfortunately, other invasive species are knocking at our door (e.g. in the southern part of New Hampshire) so we must remain vigilant.

Human activity is believed to be the primary mechanism for the spreading of variable milfoil. Therefore, educating all of our water body users is essential to our work. In order to take a more proactive approach to the problem of invasive species, we again applied for and received a Lake Host grant, from New Hampshire Lakes Association, that allowed us to conduct boat inspections and provide education to visitors of Lake Ossipee and its bays. Through the support of Kevin Price, owner of Ossipee Lake Marina, and his general manager Tim Kupka, we were able to conduct 788 boat inspections last summer at this location. Sadly, our paid Lake Host, Nancy Johnson passed away just as the season was about to start. She was truly dedicated to the work and we will miss her.

One of the most enjoyable aspects of our FAISC efforts is being on the lakes and ponds as we:

- Conduct surveys to look for new infestations and to characterize existing milfoil sites.
- Work with contractors as we help them to prioritize the work and ensure local support.
- Respond to calls from citizens who may have identified an invasive species.

We continue to work closely with the milfoil groups of Effingham and Ossipee to communicate what we are doing as well as to learn from their progress. Since several infestations now cross town boundaries, coordination is critical.

Once again in 2016 we took a dual path approach to milfoil control:

- Diver Assisted Suction Harvesting (DASH) - services provided by AB Aquatics
- Herbicide treatment - services provided by SOLitude

DASH efforts began in the June timeframe and continued through October as we worked a number of areas in Middle Danforth, the channel to Upper Danforth, Upper Danforth (a.k.a. Huckins Pond), the Ossipee River and near the Ossipee Lake Marina. A total of 23.5 days of work was completed.

In June we did a herbicide treatment that included 19.3 acres of Upper Danforth (Huckins Pond).

Feedback from lake abutters has been positive towards all of this work. A number of residents are again able to use their swimming areas due to the significant reduction of variable milfoil.

We were fortunate to receive NHDES grants again this year to supplement out local funding sources. A number of local groups and individuals made contributions to the milfoil gift account of the town. We sincerely thank you for your generosity!

As new areas of infestation are added, we find that the total area that must be managed is increasing over time. This is due to the fact that once an area is infested, ongoing management will be required. In the early years (e.g. 2002) we mitigated an area of about 2 acres while recent treatment areas have been more than 20 acres!

Spending is summarized as follows:

- \$17,000. Town budget
 - \$9,250. Milfoil gift account spend (citizens and businesses)
 - \$462. Admin.
- Total Spend = \$26,712.

HERITAGE COMMISSION OF FREEDOM, NH

Annual Report for the year 2017

This Commission was established at the March 2009 Town Meeting for the purpose of researching and recording the history of buildings and land features in the Town of Freedom, NH, offering education to the public and responding to all Town's Boards and private organizations and individuals on their questions regarding these matters.

The seven members and five alternates meet five times a year to report, plan and transact formal business of the Commission. Agenda and approved meeting minutes are available on the Town Web Site and in printed form at the Town Office. The public is always welcome at these meetings and to participate in the activities.

The real work is done by members, associates and friends outside of the meetings. We have a list of projects that will take years to accomplish. During 2017 our efforts were focused on:

- Motivate and assisted the Elementary School students to research and issue an Inventory Report of the present school building. They did an outstanding job.
- Began a project to erect informative signs on abandoned school locations in the area. A self-guided tour brochure will be established.
- In September Nadine Miller from the Division of Natural and Cultural Resources and Megan Rupnik, State Survey Coordinator attended the Commission meeting to meet the members and exchange ideas. The subject of demolition policy was discussed. Ms. Rupnik visited again in November for a tour of the Town. She also shared information about inventorying historic structures by one-page forms.
- On the first Sunday afternoon of OHW our president, Alan Fall presented a visual history of the where, how and why roads were established in Freedom and surrounding areas. This presentation is available on DVD disk.

- In cooperation with the Historical Society Alan conducted a very successful tour of Watson Hill Road area. Many stories of original residents were told.
- The Commission applied for and received a \$10,000 Moose Plate Grant from the Division of Historical Resources to renovate the Roller Shed. The project was completed in May 2017.

In October Alan Fall met with Selectmen to request that in case of proposed demolition of Freedom structures the Heritage Commission be notified so that photos and documents can be made before it is gone. The BOS agreed.

A chapter on Historical Resources in Freedom was submitted and accepted by the Planning Board for inclusion in the updated master plan.

Members and alternates contributed 940 hours to the accomplishment of Commission business in 2017.

To this day, it is the most photographed tree in Freedom when its leaves turn a brilliant red in the Fall. The drawing by Terri Brooks, has captured Freedom Old Home Week’s 2017 theme, “Rooted and Growing in Freedom”.
